I have enclosed a picture of the Yosemite Thanksgiving Day Dinner invitation aboard the United States Ship, the USS Yosemite, from November 23, 1944. I am always amazed that the USS Yosemite was in service for 50 years. Having been on the last crew deployed, I can attest that we did not win every competitive award by accident. I am incredibly proud to be alongside Cdr. Phil Johnson (Repair Officer) and help us accomplish our overall mission. We were a team led by an experienced and competent professional who knew his people and allowed all of us at every level to do our job, as ARO Production was the name of the game. I attribute my success to the leadership
